CARF

(California Authority of Racing Fairs)

Formed in 1985 as a "joint powers authority" for the purpose of conducting horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering at California's fair facilities, CARF includes fairs at Stockton, Pleasanton, Vallejo, Santa Rosa, San Mateo, Ferndale, and Fresno. CERF

(California Equine Retirement Foundation)



Founded in 1986, CERF provides charitable assistance to race and performance horses at the conclusion of their working careers, through permanent

CHRB

(California Horse Racing Board)

Created in 1933 by a constitutional amendment, the CHRB regulates parimutuel wagering for the protection of the betting public, to promote horse racing and breeding industries, and to maximize State of California tax revenues. A seven-member commission appointed by the Governor supervises all race meetings in the state. Its princi-



pal activities include licensing, sanctioning of rule violators, designating racing and charity days, and acting as a quasi-judicial body in matters pertaining to horse racing meets. Contact Ingrid Fermin, Executive Director, (916) 263-6000. http://chrb.ca.gov.

CHRIMS

(California Horse Racing Information Management Systems)

Since 1992, CHRIMS has been providing California racetracks with data processing, accounting reports, and related



services, including statutory and contractual distributions of wagering takeout, simulcast host fee settlement, detailed purse calculations, moneyroom teller balancing and cash reconciliation, and handle and pool accounting reports. CHSA

(California Horsemen's Safety Alliance)

Formed in 2002 by CTT and TOC to oversee California horsemen's workers' compensation insurance program, including the monitoring of claims and payroll data. CMC

(California Marketing Committee)

Funded by the passage of Senate Bill 27 in 1998, CMC is funded by a portion of the wagering handle at California's satellite facilities, with the express purpose of marketing and promoting Thoroughbred and Fair horseracing, and defraying the cost of workers' compensation coverage. CMC maintains subcommittees that focus on industry marketing opportunities and initiatives throughout the State, and beyond, and is comprised of marketing personnel from various racing associations and fairs. CTRA

(California Thoroughbred Breeders Association)

Founded in 1937, CTBA is a non-profit company dedicated to the advancement of Thoroughbred breeding and racing in California, and is the official registering agency for California-bred Thoroughbreds. A percentage of wagering handle on Cal-bred races – totaling more than \$14 million annually – is deposited with the CTBA to be paid to the owner, breeder, and stallion owners to encourage the breeding of

CTBL

(California Thoroughbred Business League)

A non-profit entity formed after passage of Assembly Bill 701 in 2004, it oversees and administers workers' compensation reduction programs that render California Thoroughbred racing more competitive. CTF

(California Thoroughbred Foundation)

A non-profit organization founded in 1958 through the CTBA, the Foundation funds education, research, and development of equine-related projects. It awards two scholarships each year to exceptional veterinary students at U.C. Davis who demonstrate an interest in pursuing equine-related

(Northern California Equine Foundation)

Founded in 1978, NCEF if a non-profit corporation with the express purpose of building and operating equine hospitals at the major Northern California racetracks. Its first hospital opened at Bay Meadows in 1982, and operated until the late 90's, when the property

upon which it was located was sold for development. The NCEF hospital at Golden Gate Fields, built by Magna Entertainment Corp., owner of Golden Gate, opened in December 2003. (Southern California Equine Foundation)


Established in 1976 as a charitable organization, the Foundation is dedicated to the care of the injured horse.

SCOTWINC

(Southern California Offtrack Wagering Inc.)

Formed in 1988 as a limited partnership whose partners include Southern California Thoroughbred racing associations, CARF, Horsemen's Quarterhorse Racing Association, and TOC, SCOTWINC operates an audiovi-



sual signal system for the simulcasting of horse racing to Southern California satellite facilities from a wagering hub at Los Alamitos. A portion of the handle received from such simulcasting is used to reimburse racing associations, fairs, and horsemen for the costs of certain offsite stabling and vanning expenses, with those funds being administered by its Stabling & Vanning Committee.
